Welcome

- Timeline: Aim to have final Task Force recommendations in mid-October.
 - Task Force member wondered if this was enough time to incorporate recommendations into legislative actions. Legislator in attendance said October will give enough time to get files open within the Legislative Council and get mechanics of eventual bills going.
- Legislative advisors attended the meeting and plan to attend subsequent meetings as they are available.
 - Sen. Peter Wirth, Rep. Tara Lujan were in attendance and introduced themselves.
- Public engagement process was finalized, and Maggie Fitzgerald will serve as media contact. The website also went live on Aug. 15.

50 Year Water Plan Consensus Input

- Plan status and review process:
 - Drafts have been reviewed by OSE, other state agencies, task force, tribal partners and acequia community.
 - Plan is now poised for public release but working with governor's office to add more info about current and proposed projects in recommendations. Thoughtful feedback from task force was very helpful and has been incorporated into the plan.
 - Task Force members are encouraged to participate as individuals during the public review period.
- In identifying priorities within the plan, some Task Force members were interested in using an approach that captured issues that are cross-cutting or that must be addressed as a prerequisite to take action on other issues.
- The Task Force found consensus in prioritizing innovation water conservation, protecting groundwater health, improving upland watershed health, modernizing water infrastructure and modernizing administrative practices for water (which includes supply and demand) within the 50 Year Plan. Two possible priority issues that were crosscutting other issues were continued research and planning focused on agency and community capacity and equity.
 - Terms "modernize" may be changed to avoid language that would enable impairment to traditional communities
- There was desire for definitions to make items actionable, including agency jurisdiction. Language should also be accessible to the general public.
- The input on the 50 Year Water Plan is one task force objective, the other being the development of Task Force recommendations independent of the plan. While some of these priorities overlap, task force recommendations can be solutions that were not included in the 50 Year Water Plan.

Charter adoption

The charter was adopted by consensus with no additional revisions or comments from Task Force members. The charter is a living document and can be revised as needed in the future.

Work Group Orientation

Rebecca Roose presented an orientation and overview of roles and expectations within work groups (see presentation).

- Work Group Guide and Recommendation Reporting Form:
 - The executive committee is open to feedback on the work group guide and reporting form, which will be used to standardize recommendations from all three work groups.

- Goal is to finalize the format and form of these two documents (not substantive content of recommendations) will be finalized by Aug. 29 meeting.
- Let the Executive Committee and/or NM First know if you've got suggestions for different additional resources and tools to be successful in work groups.
- Consider what research and supporting information Utton Center and others can gather to assist in discussions and creating recommendations within your work group.
- A task force member asked if groups needed to determine co-leads during this (Aug. 15)
 meeting. Groups were encouraged to navigate this on their own as needed but consider
 that time is of the essence.
- Work Groups should remain focused on the issue areas the full task force previously came to consensus on.
